Want to quickly spot AI-generated content? Look for these telltale words and phrases that real humans rarely use in everyday writing:

Overused Introductory Phrases

- "It is important to note that..."
- "It is worth mentioning that..."
- "It should be emphasized that..."
- "As an AI language model..."
- "I don't have personal opinions, but..."
- "Based on my knowledge..."
- "In the realm of..."

Excessive Transitions

- "Furthermore"
- "Moreover"

Overly Formal or Academic Language

- "In many cases..."
- "Generally speaking..."

Overly Enthusiastic or Marketing-Speak

- "Revolutionary"
- "Game-changing"
- "Cutting-edge"
- "State-of-the-art"
- "Unprecedented"
- "Transformative"
- "Incredible"

Robotic Agreement

- "I understand your perspective completely."
- "You make an excellent point."
- "That's a great question."
- "You're absolutely right."
- "I'd be happy to assist with that."

Replacing these terms with more natural alternatives will instantly make your AI-generated content feel more authentic and human.
